## Luke 8:1-3

<sup>1</sup> Afterward [Jesus] journeyed from one town and village to another, preaching and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God. Accompanying him were the Twelve <sup>2</sup> and some women who had been cured of evil spirits and infirmities, Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out, <sup>3</sup> Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza, Susanna, and many others who provided for them out of their resources.

## Mark 19:9

<sup>9</sup> When [Jesus] had risen, early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of whom he had driven seven demons.
